- To identify community needs through feedback and relationship building including safety
- To assess and monitor the Crime stats in each community
- To develop Crime Prevention goals and objectives in each First Nation community
- To educate and exercise identified Crime Prevention initiatives in each First Nation community
- To promote First Nation traditions and culture with community based programs
- To advocate positive relations between the community and the Lakeshore Regional Police Service
- To maintain a monthly reporting schedule

Qualifications for Success in this role include, but are not limited to:

- No Criminal Record, however, final approval will be made at the discretion of the Chief of Police.
- Applicant MUST be able to obtain a security clearance including vulnerable sector check

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BIKE SAFETY

Bicycle Child Safety tips and rules.

Bicycle child safety is crucial. We as parents need to enforce rules and teach our children the proper safety lessons to insure safe riding for all kids.

Bike riding is a great way to get exercise and fresh air and share time as a family. Bike riding is a lot of fun, but accidents happen.

Every year, about 300,000 kids visit the emergency room because of bike injuries. It is important to remember that a bicycle is not a toy; it's a vehicle. So, what are some bicycle child safety tips we can all learn?

- The first rule of riding scooters, skateboards, bikes, and rollerblades is "Wear a Helmet". Studies show that 74-85% of bicycle related head injuries could be prevented with the proper use of a helmet.
- Dress your children in bright colors when riding. Light and bright colored clothing can easily be seen by motorist.
- Tuck away shoelaces or other strings or cords. Untied shoelaces dangle--they may get caught in the moving parts of your bike. Loose or baggy clothing can also be dangerous--so make sure you wear snug clothes.
- When entering a sidewalk, path or driveway, stop completely. Look left, right and left again. Always knowing what is around you insures safety for both your child and motorist.

BIKE SAFETY

Bicycle Child Safety tips and rules continued...

- Buy a bicycle that is the correct size for your child. A child who has been given a bicycle that he/she will "grow into" is much more likely to be injured in an accident than a child with a properly sized bicycle.
- Ride in the same direction as traffic, using the extreme right side of the road.
- Use proper hand signals when stopping and turning.
- Obey all traffic rules.

Parents should teach children basic traffic rules and make sure they ride in safe places.

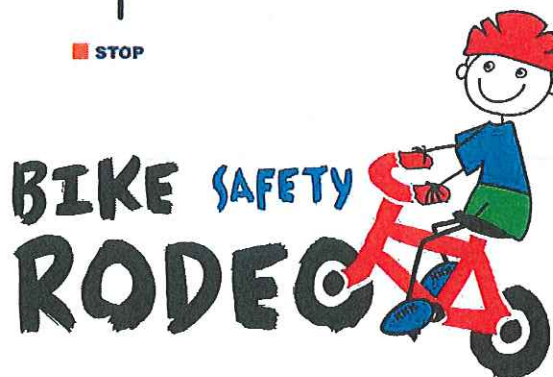
Bicycle child safety is very important for the health of young children.

IMPAIRED DRIVING

Impaired driving penalties for blood alcohol levels between 0.5 to .08

Did You Know?

On average, from 2012 to 2016, each year 74 people were killed and 1,099 people were injured in collisions involving at least one driver who had consumed alcohol prior to the collision. Stricter enforcement equals fewer fatalities.

There are lots of blood alcohol concentration (BAC) estimators available online that can give you a rough estimate of what your BAC might be after consuming alcohol. These tools provide estimates based on your sex and weight, but it is important to keep in mind the other factors that can affect your BAC, such as an empty stomach, medication, mood, fatigue level and the rate of consumption.

But most importantly, please be aware that in certain individuals, impairment can happen with even a small amount of alcohol. It's important that you assess your ability to drive regardless of how much you consume. Impaired driving, regardless of the amount of alcohol consumed, is a criminal offence. Alberta's Impaired Driving Sanctions

For drivers with blood alcohol over .08, who are impaired by drugs or alcohol, or refuse to provide requested sample(s):

Federal Penalties: Criminal charge for BAC over .08, impaired by drugs or alcohol or refusal to provide requested sample(s). All associated penalties imposed by the courts.

Provincial Sanctions:

As of April 9, 2018:

- 1st offence within a 10-year period: immediate 90-day licence suspension and 3-day vehicle seizure, "[Planning Ahead](#)" course, mandatory one-year participation in ignition interlock program. Drivers who chose not to participate in the ignition interlock program will remain suspended for the one-year term.
- 2nd offence within a 10-year period: immediate 90-day licence suspension and seven day vehicle seizure, "[Impact](#)" course, mandatory one-year participation in ignition interlock program. Drivers who chose not to participate in the ignition interlock program will remain suspended for the one-year term.
- 3rd offence within a 10-year period: immediate 90-day licence suspension and seven day vehicle seizure, "[Impact](#)" course, mandatory one-year participation in ignition interlock program. Drivers who chose not to participate in the ignition interlock program will remain suspended for the one-year term.
- Mandatory participation in [Ignition Interlock Program](#) after criminal conviction for one year.

For drivers with blood alcohol .05 to .08:

- 1st offence - Immediate 3-day licence suspension and 3-day vehicle seizure.
- 2nd offence within a 10-year period - Immediate 15-day licence suspension, 7-day vehicle seizure, "Crossroads" or "Planning Ahead" course.
- 3rd offence within a 10-year period - Immediate 30-day licence suspension, 7-day vehicle seizure, "Impact" course.

For new (GDL) drivers with blood alcohol or blood drug concentration over .00

As of April 9, 2018, GDL drivers found with **any** alcohol, cannabis, or illegal drugs in their system when operating a vehicle:

**GDL drivers who meet the requirements for criminal level impaired driving will be subject to any and all provincial sanctions and criminal penalties that apply.

1,270 people are killed or injured each year in collisions involving a drinking driver.

Plan ahead

Don't be a statistic. Instead of drinking and driving, be a designated driver (DD). If you look after your friends, they'll look after you.

Alberta's Impaired Driving Sanctions

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- Mandatory participation in [Ignition Interlock Program](#) after criminal conviction for one year.

IS DRUG-IMPAIRED DRIVING A NEW LAW?

Actually, drug-impaired driving has been illegal in Canada since 1925.

BUT CANNABIS IS LEGAL. SO, IT'S LESS DANGEROUS, ISN'T IT?

Cannabis was legalized in Canada October 2018. This doesn't mean that driving under the influence of cannabis is less dangerous.

Alcohol is also legal but drinking and driving is very risky and so is driving after using cannabis. In fact, research has shown that cannabis is involved in 45% of drug-positive driver deaths in Canada.

ISN'T DRINKING AND DRIVING MORE DANGEROUS?

No. Drug-impaired driving is as risky as driving while alcohol-impaired. Driving after consuming cannabis doubles the risk of an accident.



BUT IT'S EASIER TO DRIVE AFTER USING CANNABIS THAN AFTER DRINKING ALCOHOL, RIGHT?

The idea that it's safer or easier to drive after using cannabis is simply not true. Cannabis, cocaine, and other drugs impair the ability to drive. If a person drives after using drugs they risk their own safety and the safety of their passengers, other drivers, cyclists, and pedestrians.

DRUGS, INCLUDING CANNABIS:

- affect motor skills
- slow reaction time
- impair short term memory
- impair concentration
- cause drivers to vary speed
- cause drivers to weave in their lane or even cross into other lanes
- reduce a driver's ability to make decisions quickly
- reduce a driver's ability to handle unexpected events
- take time to leave one's system

DRUG IMPAIRED DRIVING

WHAT HAPPENS IF A DRIVER GETS STOPPED AFTER USING CANNABIS OR ANOTHER DRUG?

Following a legal roadside stop, police can demand an oral fluid sample and/or conduct an Standardized Field Sobriety Test (SFST) if they suspect a driver is under the influence of a drug.

WHAT HAPPENS IF A DRIVER IS CHARGED WITH DRUG-IMPAIRED DRIVING?

Drivers convicted of driving under the influence of cannabis or other drugs could:

- have their license suspended
- have their vehicle impounded
- be fined
- face criminal charges
- go to jail

Check the laws for your province or territory to find out more.
